Dear Parents,

It has been customary over the years for the school nurse to administer "over the counter" (OTC) medication such as Panadol to your child/ward when he/she presents to the sick bay/health office with a complaint of a symptom of a common illness. However, guided by the Nursing Council of Jamaica and the Ministry of Education, the school nurse will no longer be able to give your child/ward any medication without the written order from a doctor.

Please note the new medication policy /guidelines below:

1. If your child/ward has a long standing medical condition such as asthma, allergies, seizures, diabetes, hypertension, heart disease and other diseases for which he/she takes prescription medication, you may leave a set of their prescription medication, properly labeled and current, with the nurse, in the event of a dose being missed or forgotten, or in the event of urgent need at school.

2. While we advise that as much as possible medications be given at home, if the time for prescribed dosages falls within school hours, (for example when being given three times daily), a set of medication may be left with the school nurse for administration at the time specified. No more than 2 - 3 doses of the medication must be presented to the nurse in the pharmacy labeled container.

3. If your child **does not take prescription medication** but suffers from frequent headaches, painful periods, sinusitis etc, and **uses OTC medications** such as **Histal**, **Cetamol/Panadol**, **Antacids (e.g. Dica etc.)**, **Cetamol** /**Panadol cold and flu/ Multisymptom and others**, a **standing order should be provided from your doctor to the school nurse**. The nurse will keep this standing order on file and administer medication to the child as needed, **based on the nurse's assessment**. Please remember that if your child is ill or in need of medical treatment he/she should not be sent to school.

There are no changes to our protocols for emergency medical treatment.

If you have questions regarding this medication policy or other issues regard the administration of medication to your child/ward while at school you may contact the school nurse.
